

“Culture of Vocations”

Fr. Raymond Hubert shared his thoughts about vocations with us at Serra Club breakfast on Tuesday, December 2, 2008. Concerning the shortage of vocations and priests, he believes what the Pope said, i.e., there is no shortage of vocations, just a shortage of priests. God is still calling, but an insufficient number of men are responding.

The primary reason that men are not responding is that the “culture” of vocations, he proposes, has been lost. As a youngster in Rhode Island, Fr. Hubert remembers that the churches, the schools, the priests, the parishes, and yes, the families encouraged young men to seriously consider the priesthood. Today, the culture as changed, as there is insufficient recruiting by the just mentioned groups. Times and places have changed, and the culture of active recruiting has been lost.

As a young lad, Fr. Raymond remembers that the priests visited every family each year at home, and they also visited the children at school and in CCD classes. Their mission was one of recruitment, suggesting the priesthood to potential candidates.

So what’s the fix? Be proactive in recruiting and coaching at all levels. Start with the grade schools and continue with the middle and high schools. Be on the look out for prospects! Establish a vocations committee in each parish, with members who will contact potential seminarians. Place a chaplain – a priest but more likely a deacon -- in every college Newman Center. If the college, Catholic or public, does not have one, get one started. Use the internet. Set up chat rooms and blogs. Have communication and positive reinforcement with and among priesthood candidates. Fr. Hubert ended with a challenge to all Serrans. Prayer is great, but not enough. Get involved with recruiting, particularly at the high school level.


